This month of February, 2 DBQ sports regattas were scheduled to be held.






First one at Emerald Lakes hosted by **BROADWATER DRAGONS** on 8th February and the other at Kawana Waters hosted by BRD on 16th February.

Recipe Page

Lemon Slice

INGREDIENTS

- ✓ 250g sweet plain biscuits
- ✓ 125g butter melted
- ✓ ¾ cup coconut
- ✓ ½ can condensed milk
- ✓ 1 lemon zested
- √ 2 cups icing sugar
- √ 1½ tabs butter melted
- ✓ ¼ cup lemon juice * to taste

INSTRUCTIONS

- Step 1 Crush biscuits and mix in coconut.
- Step 2 Add finely grate lemon rind and mix.
- Step 3 Combine melted butter and condensed milk and add to dry mixture. Stir well.
- Step 4 Press into a lined slice cake tin and set in fridge.
- Step 5 Icing: Mix icing sugar, melted butter and lemon juice and ice when cooled.





How It All began.....

For anyone who missed the Club's Christmas Party, I have included the history of our club. The committee is currently in the process of organizing an event in June to celebrate 15 years. Watch this space...

In February 2004, Bruce Eckersley, a former member had the opportunity to borrow a boat from Currumbin Dragon Boat Club to see if there would be any interest on the Peninsula. Initially 24 people came along and the club was formally registered with DBQ on the 28th June, 2005. At this stage, the club was based at Woody Point and by 2007 the registered members had grown to 101.

The growth in numbers increased with the formation of the Breast Cancer Survivor Team and this is how the Redcliffe Pink Snapdragons began. Jayne Coe was diagnosed with Breast Cancer in September 2004 and during her chemotherapy treatment her mother read a magazine article about Dragon Boat paddling and the benefits for Breast Cancer survivors. Jayne loved the idea and after her second chemotherapy session she joined the Redcliffe Red Dragon Boat Racing Club and began paddling with them as their first Breast Cancer survivor member.

In May 2005, it was decided by Jayne and Linda Riedel to create a Breast Cancer Survivor team as part of the club, Jayne chose the name 'Pink Snapdragons' for something pretty and feminine for herself and for future member to really feel like women. Pink snapdragons flowers are also strong and long lasting.

The club continued to grow and became one of the largest in the Brisbane area. It was also very competitive, with the club attended National and International Regattas. In 2008, the club attended the Hong Kong International Regatta with the Women's B team winning Gold. Approximately 50 club members represented Queensland at this Regatta and the Open's team consisting mostly of Redcliffe paddlers won Silver medals.

The club has continued to attend Regattas intrastate, nationally and overseas. We have produced some elite athletes and steerers who have represented Redcliffe as part of the State and National teams and also Australia at International level. Our Pink Snapdragons attend the International Participatory Regattas held every 4 years at various situations around the world. Great fun and celebrations are had by all.

In 2017 thanks to a great team led by Cheryl Rigby and Tina Van Kuyl the club was successful in obtaining a grant toward construction of our clubhouse with Get Playing Places & Spaces. The Moreton Bay Regional Council also confirmed that they would contribute towards the project. Sadly, Jayne lost her battle, but in typical Jayne style left a gift to the club towards the completion of our magnificent clubhouse. A garden was made in Jayne's honour and can be found in the front of our 'Paddlers Den'.
